HISTORY

In 2013, Austin Angels began a pilot of the Love Box program with a single mother fostering six teenage boys. Each month, a group of volunteers would put together a "Love Box" of items tailored to their specific needs and a handwritten note of encouragement for each child. A meaningful bond between the children, caregivers, and volunteers was formed through the process of delivering the boxes and spending intentional time together. The volunteers showed up consistently each month for the boys, took an interest in their lives, celebrated their birthdays, and attended important events. The boys went from failing in school, struggling socially, and not attaching to getting straight As, making friends, and saying "I love you" for the first time. After a wildly successful pilot program, the Love Box program was formally launched in January 2015. It has since grown to serve numerous families in the Austin area and across the country. In 2017, the Dare to Dream mentoring program was launched and began serving youth on a one-on-one basis.

National Angels launched its first chapter in 2016 and continues to expand across the country. CEO and founder Susan Ramirez believes that every child deserves the opportunity to grow up to become the person they were always intended to become, and every chapter of National Angels plays a role in making that vision a reality.

FOSTER CARE

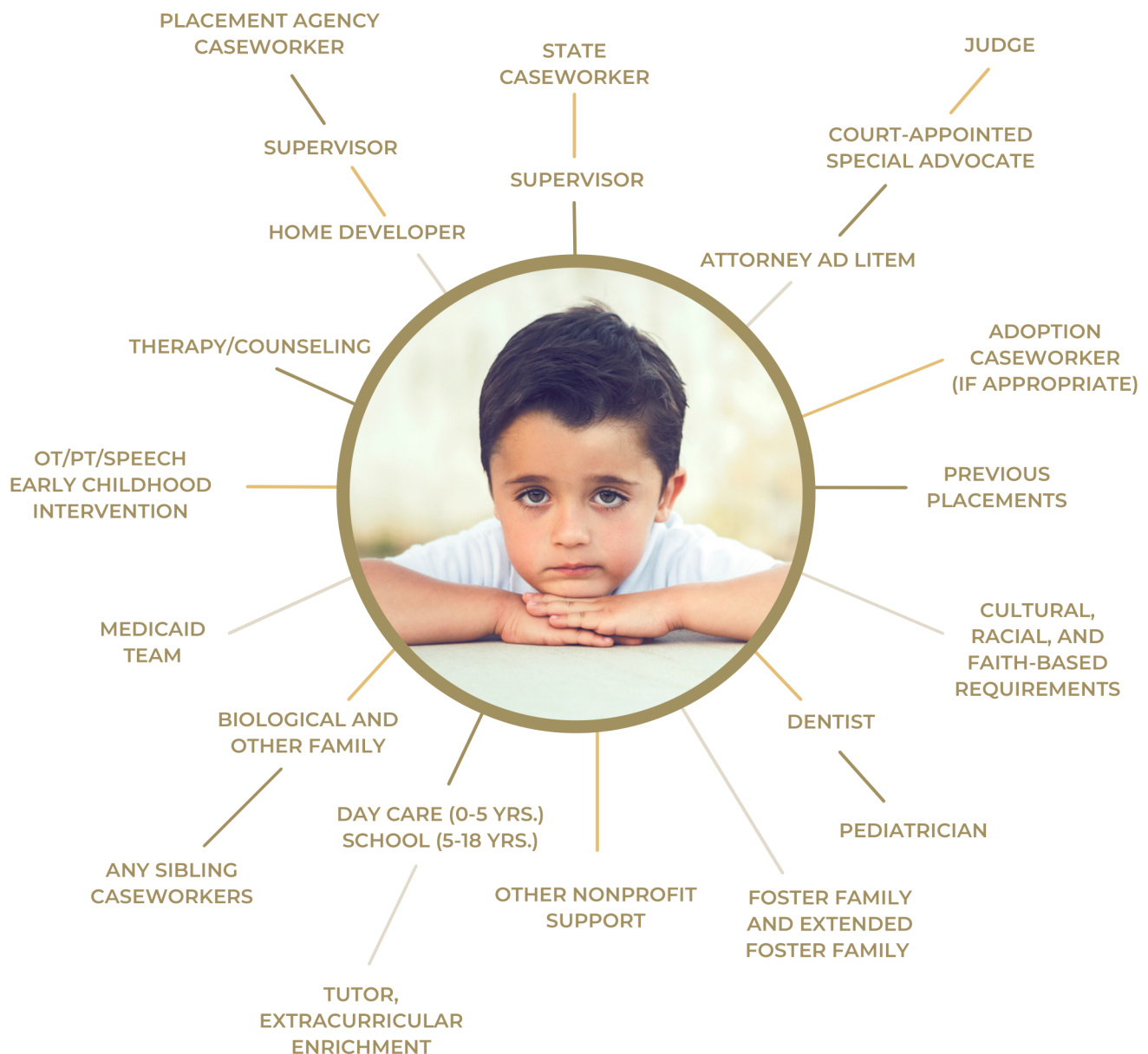
Children are removed from their homes and placed in foster care due to neglect, abandonment, or because they are the victim of physical, sexual, or emotional abuse. When children are removed from the home they are confused and upset, and they need the temporary protection and nurturing that a foster family can provide. In the foster care system, children often move homes many times. This happens for many reasons and may be due in part to foster parents feeling unsupported and overwhelmed.

In 2019, the child welfare system cost our country 5.3 billion dollars. We know we must address the poverty of social capital and its negative effects on the foster care community at the root in order to make a difference.



THE STATE OF FOSTER CARE

We know children and youth in foster care will move households, on average, seven times within two years. This is a holistic view of what it means to be a child who experiences foster care. Children who grow up in foster care will receive approximately \$1M worth of social services by the time they age out at 18 years old.



UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS

NATIONAL ANGELS RESEARCH STUDY

In 2021, Texas Institute for Child & Family Wellbeing at the University of Texas began the first phase of researching the impact of National Angels' programs. Major findings show our programs are combatting the statistics.

MEETS IMPORTANT NEEDS



Programs meet immediate needs and provide long-term support for children, youth, and families that is not offered through traditional service models. (1)

Our Outcomes

Volunteers provide important tangible and emotional support, which reduces caregiver stress and improves retention.

RELATIONAL PERMANENCE



Relational permanence positively impacts a variety of outcomes for youth, such as social skills, mental health, self-esteem, and educational achievements. (2)

Our programming provides a community of support and positive connections to children and youth experiencing foster care.

INCREASED NORMALCY



Normalcy has been shown to play an important role in promoting success for youth in foster care, and their identity formation. (3)

Our Outcomes

Children and youth exhibit improved confidence, behavior, and relationships with others as a result of the support received and relationships established.

GENERATES SOCIAL CAPITAL



Supporting caregivers and mitigating stressors promotes family resilience, sustaining and improving family functioning despite multiple risk factors. (4)

Increased social capital helps reduce hardships experienced by children and families by providing relationship-based resources to navigate challenges.

LOVE BOX


We created the Love Box program to provide a sense of community and support for fostering families through intentional giving, relationship building, and mentorship.

THE NEED

Children are removed from their homes and placed in foster care due to neglect, abandonment, or because they are the victim of physical, sexual, or emotional abuse. Because of this trauma, they often experience PTSD at a rate more than twice that of combat veterans. When children are removed from the home, they are confused and frightened. They need the temporary protection and nurturing that a foster family can provide. The goal of foster care is to reunify children with their family in a safe, stable, and permanent environment. When that can't occur, children become available for adoption. Regardless of the outcome, we know that trauma can only be healed in the context of healthy, supportive, and unconditional relationships.

OUR PROGRAM

The Love Box program provides fostering families with community and the holistic support they need to continue to do the important and meaningful work of being a foster parent. As a Love Box group, volunteers will be matched with a fostering family based on location, compatibility, and scope of needs. When families are matched with committed volunteers who show up monthly, parents feel more supported and children gain a greater sense of belonging and self-confidence. Volunteers seek to build relationships with their family by spending quality time with the whole family: playing games, sharing a meal, and being intentional. They can also create and deliver personal care packages based on current practical needs. Our goal is to help sustain and build an infrastructure of support to serve the children and caregivers experiencing foster care. This program requires a one-year commitment, but the connections and impact last a lifetime.

Love Box



DARE TO DREAM

We created the Dare to Dream program (for youth ages 15-22) and Dare to Dream Jr. program (for youth ages 11-14) to provide one-on-one mentorship to youth in care. Our mentors are advocates, guides, role models, valued friends, and available resources who guide youth in their accomplishment of developmental milestones through intentional giving, relationship building, and mentorship.

Mentors provide guidance through developmental milestones such as:

- Building healthy relationships
- Forming graduation plans
- Creating healthy habits
- Obtaining a driver license

THE NEED

Young people who have grown up within the foster care system have experienced instability in their lives and often disproportionately suffer from learning disabilities, limited life skills, health issues, and emotional and behavioral struggles that lead to negative developmental outcomes. Youth who age out of foster care without having been adopted or reunified with their families have less financial, emotional, and social support than their peers, yet they are often expected to be as self-sufficient as those who have familial support and guidance. This lack of assistance and resources combined with the various traumas these youth have experienced negatively affects their success and overall well being. As a result of having to overcome a childhood of abuse and neglect, removal from their parents, unstable living arrangements, multiple foster placements, and weak support systems, youth who age out of care enter young adulthood without a healthy foundation upon which they can build their futures and work to break the generational cycles that affect youth in care

OUR PROGRAM

The Dare to Dream program provides youth with a mentor to help them navigate life's challenges and to provide relational support. Mentors build a connection and rapport with youth as they develop and hone life skills with the specific goals of achieving positive outcomes and learning independent living skills. Mentors offer advice, provide a safe and healthy positive role model, and help empower the youth to set and accomplish personal and professional goals. The youth in our Dare to Dream program need the wisdom, advice, encouragement, and community that mentors can provide. A mentor commits to meeting with the youth twice a month to be intentional, set goals, and help them achieve their dreams. These relationships will hopefully last a lifetime, but the program is a year commitment. Mentors matched with a high school student are strongly encouraged to stay with the youth until high school graduation.

PROGRAM DIVERSITY

We serve children, youth, and families as well as recruit volunteers from all backgrounds within our local community, regardless of religion, marital status, ethnicity, age, financial status, gender identity, or sexual orientation because:

- We believe everyone deserves and can benefit from deep, meaningful relationships.
- We believe in being bridge builders, connecting over a shared passion of improving the foster care system through a community-based approach.
- We believe that every child, youth, and family experiencing foster care deserves to be fully seen, heard, and supported by healthy, affirming, and lasting relationships.
- We believe that every single one of us has a role to play in changing the way children, youth, and families experience foster care and that it will take a diverse community with varying backgrounds, experiences, and identities to do this.
- We believe in elevating the voices of those who are experiencing foster care and using their lived experiences to guide what it means to provide intentional support.
