



In 2003 I was blessed to have a wonderful rescue companion join my life. As a Kangal Dog, his gentle, mellow attitude about everything was a calming effect for me & an attitude that also helped to save his life. 2 failed adoptions when I met him as one of a handful of dogs harbored by a cat rescue, our meeting was nearly accidental. Ahlix lay on the cool pet store floor, sound asleep. My heart skipped a beat & I knew he would come home with me. Because of his double failed adoptions, he was donated to me & our time together began. At 1 year of age, he was already neutered & healthy after being salvaged with his rescued litter. Then in 2012 Ahlix was involved in an unusual auto accident. Rushed to emergency in Ocala, Florida, his prognosis was poor. With a 4-way displaced pelvic fracture & a punctured bladder on a 10-year-old 60-pound dog, I was advised to stop the nearly hopeless situation from escalating.

Animal lovers everywhere can be faced with that same decision. Many wonder, even years later, if we made the right choice. In this case, Ahlix wanted to live. The attending surgeon was not overly comfortable with my choice but she did note an eager attitude she saw in Ahlix's eyes. He spent the night at the ER receiving the very best care they could provide & in the morning, not only had he not 'crashed', but was more alert & responsive. The surgeon herself transported him to the main hospital at the University of Florida. Long story short, Ahlix underwent reparative surgery & went home to live out several more years in comfort, still within my arms. Some decisions evade us. In this instance, Ahlix was protected by outstanding veterinary care & his own quiet demeanor to carry him through.

last month I asked why we chose Pepsi. Only one responder but the answer was correct! This is a closeup of a star belonging to a rather kookie pinto sport horse called, you guessed it, *Pepsi*! A great trail horse, companion to colts & stallions, the love of her life for our working student, Athena,

now part of ES co-founder Polly's life, this noble steed spent his show years almost exclusively in a bitless bridle, enjoyed silly costume classes & proved his athleticism by racing (& winning) on a regular basis, with his best friend... a son of world class racing parents.



Now meet Ziggi & Zhighi! A handsome, kind, Fjord horse & an opossum, taming himself to enter our house at will, eat (& make a mess of) our cat foods! Gotta love 'em both!



Fjords are small draft horses from Norway. One of the oldest breeds in the world, known for strength & excellent temperament as a working farm horse as well as riding & driving for pleasure or competition.



Opossums eat ticks, don't get Lymes disease & hardly ever get rabies. They are fastidious & eat just about everything! Incited by fear, they 'play dead', which is an automatic response not an 'act'. They cannot control when they 'play possum' or for how long, sometimes even hours. They also eat snakes & with the exception of a Coral snake, they are immune to venom. As a much more friendly, social animal than many think, we welcome them to our farm. Zhighi knows his name & comes nightly to feed. If our door is open, he comes in, climbs onto a platform where we feed cats, who often sit nearby, patiently awaiting their turn. Zhighi himself is neat but has a habit of making crumbs which we clean up & offer the birds. The center picture is not of his hiss (which he no longer does around us) but it is a yawn. Shortly after, he waddled off to take a nap, often returning several times throughout the night...

When we say we speak with fowl language... we mean it! Our roosters & hens great us daily, sharing their songs & eggs, reveling in their seeds & salads, snacking on bugs (yeah!) & keeping watch on us all. For years we have been naming our birds after people who cross our path, who have really cool names. One of my plans for our website expansion is to increase our poultry section, featuring our nifty feathered family & the names they have chosen predominantly from strangers on the other end of a phone question. From our power company to Chewy or Insurance Company reps, critters get to enjoy a connection to moments of kindness & information how they got their names. Then cackle, or crow on!
