## **Mission statement**

Yachad brings communities together to preserve affordable housing and revitalize neighborhoods throughout the Washington, DC metropolitan area. Yachad means *together* in Hebrew and that's how we do our work: in partnership with homeowners, houses of worship and community stakeholders. We mobilize volunteers, invest financial resources, and work *together* to transform people and properties. Our mission is rooted in the Jewish responsibility to seek justice by engaging in acts of loving kindness. We welcome people of all faiths to share in our work to keep our communities inclusive and vital.



## 2016 – A Breakthrough Year

For a quarter century, Yachad—which means "together" in Hebrew—has worked in the District of Columbia to bring divergent communities together to revitalize neighborhoods and preserve affordable housing through single family home repair work and nonprofit facility renovations.

In 2016, our 26th year, we reached a major turning point that brought us to a new level of service. A \$1 million dollar grant from the National Fair Housing Alliance, a long-time Yachad partner, made it possible for us to extend our target area to Prince George's County, Maryland, and deepen the scope of our home preservation work. For example, we now have the capacity to repair entire roof systems rather than just patch a roof, replace dilapidated kitchens rather than just repair broken cabinets, and upgrade dangerous electrical and plumbing systems rather than just fix a leak or a faulty outlet.

We are delighted by and grateful for this growth and determined to stay true to our core mission to focus on serving the housing needs of lower income homeowners and providing individuals, groups, teens and real estate professionals with hands-on opportunities to improve housing, neighborhoods and commercial areas.

## Mobilize:

Yachad creates synergies among people and institutions that have a mutual stake in preserving their community. Strategic mobilization allows Yachad to maximize the impact of every dollar that we spend.

## **Building on a Solid Foundation**



Since our formation by Jewish housing activists in 1990, Yachad has bridged religious, ethnic and local geographic divides to bring disparate communities together to overcome Washington's persistent lack of safe, adequate affordable housing. We have mobilized people-skilled professionals and unskilled volunteers—and invested in the transformation of housing, neighborhoods and residents.

In 1992, we launched Sukkot in April to organize volunteers from area synagogues to spend a springtime Sunday making the homes of low-income homeowners safe and functional. Next, the Faith to Faith Community Development Program began building partnerships between Jewish real estate professionals and primarily African-American houses of worship to restore dilapidated properties in their neighborhoods.

Over the decades, Sukkot in April became Sukkot in Spring with a longer work schedule and volunteers of all ages from throughout the Jewish community, other non-profits and corporations. We instituted a homeowner's education program to provide clients with the knowledge and tools to maintain their homes. And to the Faith to Faith program, Yachad added the Neighborhood Development Assistance Program offering real estate development and construction assistance to nonprofit facilities to help them preserve their properties. Ramp It Up! has engaged teens in meaningful community service

In the fall of 2016, we helped the Black Workers Center in Anacostia create new computer space for its clients. Yachad also partnered with the Weissberg Foundation, the National Arboretum and the Washington Youth Garden to plan and construct a new educational pavilion on the Arboretum grounds.

## **The Jackson Family**

Ms. Renee Jackson and her family-four teenage to young adult daughters and four granddaughterslive in a typical Washington-area two story colonial house. Ms. Jackson has multiple sclerosis and uses a motorized wheelchair. Ms. Jackson is raising all these young people on her own. She is able to walk for short distances but finds herself quickly exhausted.

Yachad's Ramp It Up! Program built a 50' ramp along the back of the house during the summer of 2015. Twenty teens built this ramp over two weeks working under the supervision of a contractor. In 2016, Yachad continued its work to make critical interior accessibility modifications. Ms. Jackson is overjoyed by all the renovations to her home.

### Main floor accessibility renovations

The Jackson bathroom was made accessible by changing the lay-out, adding a roll-in shower, grab bars, new flooring, and shower tiling. A new first floor bedroom was created adjacent to the new bathroom creating an accessible master suite. Before this space was created, Mrs. Jackson had to crawl up the stairs to reach her bedroom. She now has a private space to call her own.

Ms. Jackson was not able to cook or prepare simple meals for her family prior to Yachad's renovation work. The appliances, cabinets, even the sink were inaccessible to her from her scooter. After the renovation, she can prepare and cook meals for her


## Financials:
