


Revenue generated for FAR is used to fund events, pay for promotional materials, award scholarships, and fund the YETI (Youth Exercise Training Initiative) program each year.




TRAILS INCOME



All funds generated by 1% for Trails are used to purchase trail equipment, provide matching funds, hire private trail contractors, and pay for manual skilled labor during trail construction.



1% FOR TRAILS EXPENSES





We started 2021 with a balance of about \$25,000 in our 1% for Trails account. This balance, combined with 2021 contributions, allowed us to complete The Yard Mountain Bike Skills Park.

*Note that \$15,000 of costs for The Yard were incurred in 2020. Total project cost was ~\$40,000.

2021 HIGHLIGHTS



RECORD-BREAKING ROYAL 50 EVENT

We welcomed 172 racers to the 2021 Royal 50 Mountain Bike Race. From across the state of Colorado and beyond, participants were thrilled with the challenging course, incredible views, and stellar location of the event. We're looking to break 200 in 2022!



RETURN OF IN-PERSON RUNBLOSSOM RACE

About 200 runners joined us for the return of the runBlossom 5K and 10K events. It was a welcome way to usher in the springs season, and we were excited to see our community embrace the event.



\$14.000 OF COMMUNITY FUNDRAISING FOR THE YARD

Our community showed UP for this fundraiser! With money pledged from local businesses, individuals, and organizations, we were able to raise over \$14,000 for The Yard. Combined with FAR's pledge and also 1% for Trails funds, the mountain bike skills park was built and completed in April of 2021, allowing kids of all ages to practice skills on manmade features.



COMPLETION OF THE YARD MOUNTAIN BIKE SKILLS PARK

The Yard Mountain Bike Skills Park includes 8 manmade features created by Progressive Bike Ramps. The trail was designed by Terra Firma Trails and FAR. Completion of the park was made possible by imported soil courtesy of the City of Cañon City Parks Department and construction assistance from the Cañon City Area Recreation and Park District. The Yard is located on Cañon City Area Recreation and Park District property adjacent to the Eagle Wing Trailhead.



OPENING OF POINT ALTA VISTA TRAIL

When the Royal Gorge Scenic Railway closed in 2012, the iconic trestles were originally slated for demolition. Lucky for our community, as trails crept closer to the structures, FAR, adjacent landowner Ty Seufer, and the City of Cañon City came together to utilize the trestles as part of the trail system. Their re-opening in 2021 was a landmark moment.



CREATION AND DISTRIBUTION OF OUTDOOR RECREATION SAFETY BOOK

As more individuals and families beging to enjoy the outdoor amenities that the Royal Gorge Region has to offer, FAR recognized that it was important to emphasize safety as well as education. With local law enforcement and first responders, FAR created a safety book and distributed it to local students and youth organizations.



STUDENT ADVENTURE GUIDE DISTRIBUTED TO LOCAL STUDENTS

As every year, we were able to produce, print, and distribute our student adventure guide to 6th graders across the county. This allows us to educate local youth and families about the wonderful recreation opportunities that have recently been added to the community.



NEAR COMPLETION OF ROYAL CASCADE CONNECTION TRAIL

After much anticipation, the connection trail from Tunnel Drive to the Royal Gorge Trails (near Fremont peak), is about to open. An epic, 3.7-mile trail that climbs 1,800 feet, Royal Cascade is set to become one of the most interesting, challenging, and beautiful trails in the area.



FIRST YEAR OF ADOPT-A-TRAIL PROGRAM

We had fifteen groups and organizations sign up to be part of the adopt-a-trail program. Currently, trails are monitored and maintained by groups that have undergone a trail training and check out FAR-owned tools. The groups racked up over 137 (wo)man hours of work clearing rocks, drainages, and trees from the trails across the community.
