Medicine in the Gold Rush

Exhibit Opening Reception

You can't deny, our sparkling gemstone, the Angels Camp Museum, just got a bump up in clarity with the inclusion of our newest exhibit. Medicine in the Gold Rush, presents a timeline of medical practices from 1848 to present. The exhibit recognizes the doctors, their instruments, and the medicines they used to keep our community healthy. Beginning with the region's original inhabitants, Mi-wuk Indians, the exhibit recognizes the cultural influences towards the early days of modern medicine. The exhibit also recognizes the social position of doctors' offices and drugstores as places where folks gathered and talked. The exhibit builds upon communication with the advent



of the telephone with a narrative by a local resident who spent many years connecting folks with only a name, a short number or a designated ring pattern. There is a documentary of a local

practitioner who actually made house calls. The exhibit includes a doctor's bag and examination equipment, medicine bottles, prescriptions, eye glasses and leg braces. There is even an antique

comfortable to lay
upon for any length of
time.

Calaveras Community Foundation Funded 2015-2016 School Field Trips to the Angels Camp Museum

Sincere thanks to the Calaveras Community Foundation (CCF) for sponsoring nine school field trips to the Angels Camp Museum during the 2015-2016 school year. As a result of a generous grant from the Calaveras Community Foundation, bus and driver fees as well as museum admission was covered for 318 schoolchildren.

Students from San Andreas Elementary, Mokelumne Hill Elementary, West Point Elementary, Copperopolis Elementary, Christian Family Learning Center, Bret Hart Union High School, and Oakendell School visited the museum. K-12 students learned that the 3-building historical park and museum brings the extraordinary history of California's Gold Rush to life through extensive indoor and outdoor exhibits on mining, ranching, Mark Twain, medicine, firefighting, artisan businesses and houses one of the largest carriage collections in the nation.

"Thank you for allowing our students to time travel through your wonderful collection of Calaveras County!" said 4th grade teacher Mr. McCarty from San Andreas Elementary School. The Angels Camp Museum is truly grateful to the Calaveras Community Foundation for offering to subsidize these expenses in order to give Calaveras County schoolchildren the opportunity to gain hands-on experience through a field trip to their community museum.

Introducing **Mr. Bob Hillis**;

Museum Docent and Artisan Print Shop Volunteer

Bob Hillis first got involved with the museum through a mutual friend, Bob Petithomme. As a commissioner, Bob P., was working on the development of the Artisan Exhibit, which was to include a historic Print Shop and he knew just who to ask for some help. Together they sourced and set up all the equipment for the Artisan Print Shop and thus, Bob Hillis became involved with the Museum. Bob has been a Docent now for about three years, participating in the first Docent training class. He also serves as an Angels Camp Museum Commissioner and is in his second, three year term. As a Commissioner, he serves on the Artifact Donations Review Committee and the Education Committee. He is often seen volunteering at the Museum community outreach booth (the Henry Angell tent) at

various events or demonstrating the printing equipment during Living History Days at the Museum.

Bob was born into a printing family. His grandfather started a print shop in San Jose in 1901 called Victor Hillis and Sons. In 1953 it incorporated to become Hillis Printing, Inc. Bob started working there when he was eight years old and continued until he graduated from Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo in 1959. Bob obtained a degree in Printing Engineering and joined Schmidt Lithograph in San Francisco. Next he moved into sales at Griffin Brothers Typography, selling to the "Mad Men" advertising agencies of the early 60's. Then he started his own printing business called Trade Litho Press, which was incorporated under the name of RC Hillis and Assoc., in 1971. Bob ran this operation until 1984, at which time he then moved to Calistoga Press, in Calistoga. He and his wife Chyrl retired to Angels Camp in 2002.

J.A. Bertola Patented in 1857 Ore Amalgamator

Not long ago this Ore Amalgamator was rediscovered at the Museum, and what a truly unique find. The complete device included a wooden structure that held the cast iron tub. This is shown on a copy of the original patent, which is on display with the tub in the mining exhibit. This tub was filled with crushed ore, water and mercury. A revolving muller would thoroughly mix the soup, assuring full contact with the mercury to any gold. After several hours, the resulting

amalgam would be removed and the waste water and free mercury would be drained from the ports. Using mercury to capture the gold within pulverized ore was a very common practice.
