Bylaws Changes Need Your Vote!

The SBS Bylaws were most likely written in 1979 when the Sacramento Blues Society was founded. The world has kept changing but the Bylaws have not kept up with the times. Over the last several months the SBS Board of Directors has been hard at work hammering out a few



desperately needed changes in the Bylaws. These changes will allow the Board of Directors to function better and more easily comply with the legal requirements mandated by state law.

SBS Members are invited to attend the Membership Holiday Gala on Sunday, December 12, 2021, where you will be entertained and will also have an opportunity to vote on the proposed changes to the SBS Bylaws.

The Board of Directors sincerely hopes all members will vote TO PASS these much-needed changes in the Bylaws. A summary is below. (The full text of the proposed changes to the Bylaws will be on the Ballot that you will receive in the mail before the Membership Holiday Gala.)

1. Qualifications of Directors. The existing Bylaws require members that want to be elected to the SBS Board of Directors to have attended six of the last eight Board Meetings. We have discovered that this does not work. We can't keep all Eleven Board seats filled with this unrealistic requirement. We propose reducing it to attending one Board meeting and being a SBS member for one year before being elected to the Board.

2. Emergency Meetings. Occasionally an issue must be quickly addressed and voted on by the Board of Directors in between our Monthly Meetings. The current Bylaw that allows for this is convoluted and unnecessarily complex, which makes compliance impractical. The newly proposed Bylaw that allows for Emergency Meetings under certain clearly defined conditions will streamline the entire process.

3. Process of Amending the Bylaws. The current Bylaws require a 75% "yes" vote of those members who attend a meeting for the purpose of voting on proposed Amendments to the Bylaws. The Board feels that a two-thirds majority or 66% is more appropriate.

Please note that this only applies to Amendments to the Bylaws. The Board is not changing the 75% vote threshold required for Amendments to the Articles of Incorporation.

Our Election Day is December 12, 2021

As mandated by our bylaws, the Sacramento Blues Society will hold its Annual Membership Meeting December 12, concurrently with our Holiday Party. This is the time we conduct any business requiring a vote from our overall membership. We will be voting to fill openings on our Board of Directors, and we'll also vote on some proposed Bylaws changes.

The Elections Committee will mail ballots to all SBS members at the beginning of November, and **ballots must be received by mail NO LATER THAN DECEMBER 12, 2021 to be counted.** Ballots have the SBS address right on them, and all you need is an envelope and stamp.

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If you plan to attend the Holiday Party, you may also BRING your completed ballot to the party and deposit it into the ballot box that will be there. All votes, whether mailed or dropped off, will be coiunted at the party, and the newly elected Board Members will be introduced to the membership at the end of the party.

There is a total of four BOD positions to fill, and there are three members running for election. (There is also an option to "write in" a candidate on the ballot.) 
As 2022 approaches and we all get back to live performances of the music we love, the renewed support of our member bands and sponsors is more important than ever. By

A Dazzling Afternoon of Emotional Rescue with BACK IN BUSINESS!

What does a frustrated Blues Society do in a worldwide pandemic that revealed itself in a sudden March 2020 whiplash lockdown – a pandemic whose tentacles are still holding on at the end of 2021? We rolled up our sleeves and made a record, featuring sixteen member

blues bands, bravely titled BACK IN BUSINESS!

Our committee (me, Sally Katen, Barbara Katen, Dana Moret) meetings started in January, 2021. The call went out to all member artists/ bands in early March, tracks were submitted by mid-May, art/packaging design, and programming took place in June, mixing, mastering and manufacturing in July--- and then, like a Monarch making a perfect two point landing on a milkweed, the CDs winged their way from New Jersey and landed in sunny Sacramento in mid-August, exactly in time for the afternoon CD release and celebration concert on Saturday, Aug.21.



Outdoors under the new giant circus tent festooned with tangerine and teal balloons (the album cover colors) on the pillowy Great Lawn at The Dante Club (2330 Fair Oaks Blvd.) was an appreciated choice for the nearly two hundred blues music fans, and even though we had two huge swamp coolers, the 84-degree temperature (unheard of in August!!) kept us comfortable.

The music however, was on fire, a real emotional rescue.

Val Starr, John Ellis and band (Val Starr, John Ellis and Frankie Munz) gave us a one song surprise - their perfectly pandemic love



song, "So Easy Isolatin' With You" before they had to head out of town for another gig.

Chanteuse piano/slide guitarist Katie Knipp and her band (Zack Proteau, bass; Neil Campisano, drums; Chris Martinez, guitar) are supporting her new Billboard Blues

charting EP, *The Well* (released in February, 2021) in an exuberant way. She can howl *and* purr in her originals--"some songs lean to-wards jazz, some towards Americana, but it's all blues at the core." Sacramento bluesman/educator/mentor/legend Mick Martin is a fan and he joined in as special guest.

SBS Board members and Blues In The Schools (BITS) co-chairs,

Rick Snyder and Jeff Herzog tag teamed as enthusiastic emcees, advised members on the current activities of their committee, and directed folks to the SBS merchandise/CD table... and the gazebo bar.

BITS protégé and emerging young guitar star, Justin Walter may not yet have a driver's license, but at age 15, he clearly knows how to drive a band. His trio (Chris Greany, drums,vocals; Ray Manina, bass,vocals) blazed on their set. Walter already understands dynam-



ics and when not to play, crucial musical knowledge that so many

players two and three times his age never seem to grasp. We all see a strong future for him!

Red's Blues, led by Beth-Reid Grigsby and her nationally known, award-winning bassist husband (and SBS HOF member) RW Grigsby, are a stellar singer-songwriting team and know their way around a Jimmy



Reed shuffle, a thumpin' rockabilly tune and a smoky ballad, all of which they performed and are on their newest 2020 release, *Broke Down in the Fast Lane*. They were joined by fellow SBS Hall of Fame bandmates, guitarist Doug Crumpacker, drummer Tim Wilbur, plus piano man Sid Morris.

The perfect afternoon (with a full happy dance floor) carried on with singer/multi-instrumentalist Kyle Rowland and his players (fellow multi-instrumentalist Todd Morgan, this day on fabulous drums, HOF guitarist Kenny Marchese and fellow HOF member R.W. Grigsby on bass, and very special guest, dazzling get-down-on-your knees gospel and blues singer and HOF member, Marcel Smith.)

Kyle, also a BITS (and Mick Martin) protégé since age 10, is a full-bore exciting entertainer now at age 27. His lifelong deep blues mission has allowed him to be mentored by some of the icons of modern blues - James Cotton, Lazy Lester, and our own Rick Estrin to name just three.



This lovely day really showed off just some of the depth and breadth of Sacramento's blues knowledge and talent, spanning styles and generations. With the invaluable production help of Liz Walker, SBS board members and volunteers, this CD release celebration

event brought us all back together - and was exactly what we wanted to share and promote in our CD, BACK IN BUSINESS!

& Friends. This show was emotionally moving and so appreciated by this old gal.



CD Review Alligator Records 50 Years of Genuine 'Houserockin' Music

(Alligator Records)

STEAL OF THE MILLENNIA

Editor's Note: This is Part I of a Four Part Review

A very distinctive album, a producer's labor of love - the kind of production that's reminiscent of a Smithsonian archival recording.

Comments on a few of the cuts on CD #1 (1970-1990)

Hound Dog Taylor (1915-1975) from Hound Dog Taylor & The House Rockers (1971)

"Give Me Back My Wig"

Love. Gotta love it - that's the best sentiment in reaction to this first cut on CD #1. The music is joyous, in your face, intimate and immediately pulls the listener into all that's special and wonderful about the kind of blues that makes you feel good. This song is straight out of a grungy South Side Chicago bar in a run-down neighborhood that would give all but Blues devotees doubts about entering.

Taylor played on a "cheap Japanese guitar," according to Bruce Iglauer, the founder and inspiration behind Alligator Records. Taylor was accompanied by Brewer Phillips's bass and Ted Harvey on

drums. The threesome was a tight trio punctuated by Taylor's shrill voice and gritty sound. Maybe Taylor's own words are the best endorsement of his style, especially so for this cut: "When I die, they'll say, 'he couldn't play shit, but he sure made it sound good!"

Koko Taylor (1928-2009) from *The Earthshaker* (1978) "I'm a Woman"

Stand aside! Koko Taylor, 'Queen of the Blues', has something to say and she will be heard. "I'm a Woman", which Taylor wrote and made a signature song in her shows, starts with a loud raspy plea, "Ohhh, yeah..." a plaintive guitar responds with a 3-note emphasis: high note and two down tones. Once again Taylor asserts, "Ohhh, yeah..." this time with a bit more modulation but the guitarist will have none of that. His 3-note response re-emphasizes her brusque intro but then Taylor reassures the listener that, "Everything, everything, everything gonna be alrighiiit" and this time the guitarist responds with a multi-note expression. There's a pause and then the hammer comes down, guitar, bass and drums sequence a set of down notes that pretty much mandates the listener to move with the beat.

With that Taylor tells her story. At the age of 12, her momma tells her she's got to sing the blues. Koko Taylor has a rough, almost raspy voice in this cut. There's declaration in her song approach, not finesse. The lyrics demand that she be seen, be heard, be given presence. It's more than a blues piece, it's a song that asserts a right to be respected. In my opinion, the inclusion of this seminal song, this re-mastered, long-gone blues masterpiece by a bewitching singer-songwriter justifies the cost of the album. It's a bracing, definitive expression of what this incomparable artist was all about.

Fenton Robinson (1935-1997) from *Somebody Loan Me a Dime* (1974) "Somebody Loan Me a Dime".

Fenton Robinson had a smooth and nuanced vocal style and was an accomplished guitarist. There was controversy about the authorship of his song "Somebody Loan Me a Dime". As currently reported (Wikipedia, Encyclopedia of the Blues), it is now rightfully attributed to Robinson. He wrote it, he recorded it in 1967, but even now misattribution acknowledges other artists as author. A freak Chicago snowstorm caused a region-wide shut down that delayed his record label's nationwide release of the album which allowed others to claim author attribution. Boz Scaggs recorded it in 1969 and falsely got attribution rights to the song and its royalties.

A lawsuit followed and Robinson did eventually reclaim ownership and royalties, but how much money he lost and what the attribution delays did to him getting the public attention he deserved will never be known. Alligator Records owner Iglauer reports that Robinson never did receive that acknowledgement. The Encyclopedia of the Blues states that "Somebody Loan Me a Dime" is one of the most covered songs in the blues repertoire of past and current artists.

The song starts with a rapid drum beat, a quick tempo guitar intro followed by piano support. The drums stay prominent throughout the intro. Robinson, in plaintive but compelling vocals, starts off -"somebody loan me a dime, I need to call my old time used to be." He is lonely and regretful and he wishes he could have his old lover back to ease his aching mind. The lyrics are simple and aren't a departure from the classic themes found in Blues songs but it's Robinson's sophisticated and nuanced singing that melds melody, instrumentation, and the lyrics into such a blues essential.

Preserving and Promoting the Blues

The Chicago Blues

Chicago blues is a form of blues music developed in Chicago, Illinois. It is based on earlier blues idioms, such as Delta blues, but performed in an urban style.



Urban blues evolved from classic blues fol-

lowing the migration of African Americans from the south to the industrial cities of the north, such as Chicago. Big Bill Broonzy and Muddy Waters joined that migration, like many others, escaping the harsh southern Jim Crow laws. Bruce Iglauer, founder of Alligator Records, stated that "Chicago blues is the music of the industrial city and has an industrial sense about it." Chicago blues is based on the sound of the electric guitar and the harmonica, with the harmonica played through a PA system or guitar amplifier, both heavily amplified and often to the point of distortion, and a rhythm section of drums and bass with piano depending on the song or performer.

Urban blues started in Chicago and St. Louis, as music created by part-time musicians playing as street musicians, at rent parties, and other events in the black community. For example, bottleneck guitarist Kokomo Arnold was a steelworker and had a moonshine business that was far more profitable than his music.

An early incubator for Chicago blues was the open-air market on Maxwell Street, one of the largest open-air markets in the nation. Residents of the black community would frequent it to buy and sell just about anything. It was a natural location for blues musicians to perform, earn tips, and jam with other musicians. The standard path for blues musicians was to start out as street musicians and at house parties and eventually make their way to blues clubs.

What drove the blues to international influence was the promotion of record companies such as Paramount Records, RCA Victor, and Columbia Records. Through such record companies Chicago blues became a commercial enterprise. The new style of music eventually reached Europe and the United Kingdom. In the 1960s, young British musicians were highly influenced by Chicago blues resulting in the British blues movement.

According to Christgau's *Record Guide: Rock Albums of the Seventies* (1981), Chicago blues saw its best documentation during the 1970s thanks in part to Alligator Records and its owner Bruce Iglauer, described by Robert Christgau as a "folkie Leonard Chess".

Chicago blues was one of the most significant influences on early rock music. Chuck Berry originally signed with Chess Records one of the most significant Chicago blues record labels. Berry met and was influenced by Muddy Waters in Chicago and Waters suggested he audition for Chess. Willie Dixon and other blues musicians played on some of Berry's early records. In the UK in the early 1960s, the Rolling Stones, the Yardbirds, and the Animals were heavily influenced by Chicago blues artists. At the same time, American artists, such as the Paul Butterfield Blues Band, John P. Hammond, and Charlie Musselwhite performed in the style of Chicago blues. Later, Cream, Rory Gallagher, and the Allman Brothers Band also pursued their own interpretations of Chicago blues songs and helped popularize blues rock.

The importance of Chicago blues cannot be overstated and its impact is one of the reasons we preserve and promote blues music!

At the Big Blues Bender in September, Sacramento Blues buddy MariLu Onweller walked over and introduced me to a handsome, soft spoken young man and said he was agreeable to being



interviewed for my Blue Notes "Casual Conversation With" column.



This young man turned out to be the amazing King Solomon Hicks, winner of the 2021 Blues Music Award for Best Emerging Artist for his album *Harlem*. He blew everyone at the Blues Bender away and I was delighted to get the opportunity to interview him.

Blue Notes (**BN**) What was your inspiration and how did you get your start in music?

King Solomon Hicks (**KSH**) My parents' eclectic music collection inspired me so much growing up. My mom would play Nina Simone

to Nas to B.B.King. I got my start playing the jam sessions in Harlem when I was thirteen.

BN: Who are your biggest musical influences?

KSH: The three kings!! (BB, Albert & Freddy) and I listen to a lot of Peter Green.

BN: What has your journey been like during the pandemic playing gigs, releasing CD's, and becoming a well-known and respected musician?

KSH: I've been fortunate to do some playing in the NY Tri-state area and with some such a dark time this past year it's been fun bringing music to the people uplifting their spirits!



BN: What has been the highlight of your career so far?

KSH: Being on stage with Joe Bonamassa, Eric Gales, Ruthie Foster, and Chris Cain.

BN: Who is the person you would most like to meet that you haven't already?

SH: I would enjoy meeting Buddy Guy!

BN: How would you describe yourself as a musician in one sentence?

KSH: I take the stylings of Robert Cray and mix it with the raw blues power of Albert King.

BN: What words or phrases do you most overuse?

BN: What are you most excited about in your life right now?

KSH: If everything goes right, I'll be on the same festival as John Fogerty and Peter Frampton in the Netherlands 2022,

BN: If you could change one thing about yourself, what would it be?

KSH: I'd change how much I love Italian food. It's hard not to gain pounds when you can eat Penne ala vodka all day.

BN: What do you consider your greatest achievement to date?

KSH: Having my trio invited to play on the Kiss cruise. People still freak out when I tell them!

BN: What is your most treasured possession?

KSH: My movie collection.

BN: Who are your heroes in real life?

KSH: A musician out of New Jersey called Junior Mack is a guitar hero of mine!
